Uniform grants for year 6 children.

If you are in receipt of the following benefits you can apply to Tower Hamlet's Benefits team for a uniform grant, which can be used to purchase your child's first secondary uniform.

How do I qualify?

To qualify, you (the parent or guardian) must be receiving one of the following:

- Income-based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Income Support
- Pension Credit Guarantee Credit
- Support from NASS (National Asylum Support Service) under part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999, or
- Have an annual income less than £16,190 (excluding child benefit and child tax credit)

How much is the grant?

The grant for 2019/20 was £110 for each child that meets the conditions.

When should I apply?

Applications can only be made between June and 30 September and only for pupils transferring to secondary school.

How do I apply?

Where a family receive housing benefit or council tax benefit from Tower Hamlets, the grant is normally paid without the need to make a separate application. Some of you have been contacted by them directly. If not, you should complete the **school clothing grant application form**. If you would like support in completing the form then I can assist every Tuesday, when I am in school.

How will I be paid?

All school clothing grants are paid into a bank or building society account in your name.

You can use music and effects to enhance your videos and you can also browse other people's videos and interact with them. *You should monitor your child's interactions regularly on TikTok, if you are allowing them to use it. Report a Video:


- On the TikTok screen, tap Menu

- Tap on the name of the person/ group (iOS) or on the Menu button (Android)
- 3. Tap on "Report"
- Follow the instructions on the screen





Online safety tips from ThinkUKnow

Gaming is loved and enjoyed by children and can be a way for children to be social, learn new skills, develop team work and relax. However, gaming also comes with risks for children. It can be difficult to keep up with the latest games and how they work.

How can I make gaming safer for my child?

Talk with your child about gaming. Talk with your child to learn the games they like. You can use NSPCC's <u>Net Aware</u> to search for apps and games to find out more about them and how safe they are.

Learn together. You can use our resources to teach your child about safer gaming at all ages. For primary age children you can use our <u>Jessie & Friends</u> (ages 4-7) and <u>Play, Like, Share</u> (ages 8-10) resources. <u>Thinkuknow</u> website has advice about gaming for older children too.

How risky is in-game chat?

Gaming is often a social activity for children and talking with friends is part of their enjoyment. However, in-game chat can pose risks such as:

- chatting with people they don't know. This can include adults that are seeking to contact children with the intention of exploitation and offences.
- inappropriate or unmoderated chat. Whilst a lot of chat is moderated, chat is live and there is a risk of exposure to sexual language, swearing or bullying.
- requests to make chat private. Once chat is moved off a monitored platform, no one is moderating it. This can be used to pressurise children into sharing personal information, photos, video or chat that they don't want to.
- offering gifts or trades. This may be used by offenders to build trust and a relationship with a child, as part of grooming.

Should I be worried about gifts and trades in gaming?

Items such as game currency, <u>skins</u>, <u>loot boxes</u>, tools and weapons are often used in games to help a player progress through the game or give increased status amongst other gamers. Often these require in-app purchases, which many children won't have access to, or require your permission for, so accepting trades or gifts may be tempting.
