

On Tuesday 30th November, St. John's attended the Tower Hamlets Girls' football competition in Mile End. From our school, thirteen girls ranging from Class 4 to 6 took part.

The girls made up two 5 a-side teams who both represented St. John's with pride. In the early matches they found their feet and put in a good effort, proving the school a force to be reckoned with.

By the end of the group stage, one of the teams were unbeaten, without even conceding a goal. Despite a spectacular goal from Sharon, and players working hard up and down the pitch, our other team were up against some of the best teams in the tournament and did not make it through to the knockout stages. The 'A' team who were still in, had scored nine goals already and went on to beat Lansbury Lawrence Primary School 1-0 due to a controversial penalty decision. In the Quarter Finals, the girls succeeded in another 1-0 victory and ploughed on into the semi-finals.

With four teams left in the competition, this game was unbelievably close. The ball was up and down the pitch but in the end, St. John's came out on top of English Martyr's school to win again and be through to the final!

Filled with adrenaline, we entered the final match against Arnhem Wharf school exhausted but excited. After a wonderful effort and some great saves from the opposing keeper, tiredness got the better of us and the opposition got a hardearned win.

Although frustrated not to win gold, we were still pleased to bring the silver medals back to school. All the girls should be so proud of what they have achieved placing second out of 35 schools.
