## Home Learning During Lockdown Survey – Summary

Thank you to all of the parents/carers that took the time to respond to the survey. We tried to make it as user friendly as possible using survey monkey and sending the questionnaires to your electronic devices. I have provided a breakdown of the results along with a brief commentary. I have included comments that you have sent in by cutting and pasting them.

Overall, the feedback was positive and I am proud of the way that our school responded to the pandemic. Nevertheless, there are always things that we can learn and do better and your responses help to shape that.

In the unwelcome event of another lockdown, we have the technology in place to start Google Classrooms immediately. Children all have Purple Mash and Mini Mash accounts. We also have a bank of devices to loan to parents/carers to support their children from the outset.






## **Commentary:** The school loaned 48 devices to families.

Q6. Did you have any of these problems during Lockdown? (Please select all that apply)


